## Letter From the CEO & Board President

Two years into our five-year strategic commitment to increase our impact, 2023 was a year of significant advancement toward our priorities and our mission of accelerating health equity.

Notable firsts in 2023 included launching a program for patients living with advanced breast cancer in areas of the world where more than 55% of breast cancer-related deaths occur, and setting the stage for providing the latest treatments developed for chronic lymphocytic leukemia as well as for chronic myeloid leukemia. Closer to home, we introduced Max GPS in the US, a program designed to address disparities in care and assist patients living with cancer in underserved communities.

#### By the end of 2023, our programs reached nearly 37,000 patients across 83 countries, our highest annual number to date.

And now, let's take a closer look at how we performed across our three priority measures.

#### **Treat More Patients**

We grew our patient reach in 2023, a measure we are relentlessly focused on as we aim to narrow the equity gap each year. Of the nearly 37,000 people who received our services, more than 33,000 were those we had supported in previous years, a reflection of the long-term commitment of our organization to these patients and families. Overall, we delivered nearly 10 million daily doses of high impact, lifeextending medications free of charge in 2023.

The first advanced breast cancer patients to receive treatment were in Mozambique, with plans underway to expand to additional countries. We expanded access in 18 countries in Africa, Asia, and Latin America by providing at least one new medication to patients in these countries, in addition to the existing

services we offer. To make all this a reality, our teams across the world - the backbone of our foundation - maintained their singular patient focus, providing accompanying services to more than 21,000 families.

#### **Amplify Our Voice**

Externally, efforts to make our patients' voices heard gained momentum. As CEO, I accepted recognitions for these efforts on behalf of The Max Foundation, including being named Health Equity Honoree by Fierce Pharma and being named a Hero of Kenya by the President of Kenya on Mashujaa Day. I also co-authored op-ed pieces with industry leaders, published in Pharmaphorum and STAT. Our active participation in patient organizations and industry and medical meetings around the world reinforced the urgent need to accelerate equitable cancer care.

#### Sustain Our Work

To sustain our work and grow our impact, we expanded the number of global partnerships. We're excited to welcome BeiGene, Eli Lilly, and the International Workshop on Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (iwCLL) to the Humanitarian Partnership for Access to Critical Treatments (Humanitarian PACT) in support of our mission to eliminate healthcare disparities for patients living with cancer in low- and middle-income countries.

Our ambition and clarity around our direction have never been stronger. With every milestone we reach, the horizon moves a little further with more families in need of assistance and more diseases to be covered. Those in urgent need of access to treatment and their families continue to guide and inspire our daily actions. Together, we are confident we can realize our vision of a world where all people, no matter where they live, can access life-extending medicines to live with dignity and hope.

# Meaningful Advancements for patients



With the addition of medicines to treat two critical diseases, advanced breast cancer and chronic lymphocytic leukemia, we expanded our patient support to a total of 13 disease areas



We introduced two new medicines, growing our access to high impact treatments for patients in need

True to our mission, we helped patients overcome barriers to treatment by providing nearly 2,300 families with transportation, disease education, or schooling support

We launched a treatment access program for women with advanced breast cancer, a disease that causes more than 55% of breast cancer-related deaths in low-resource countries



We provided over 7,000 molecular and diagnostic tests across 40 countries, reflecting the high unmet need as a barrier to survival



Our global geographic reach increased to 83 countries

We launched Max GPS in July 2023, expanding our patient navigation program to include cancer patients across underserved communities in the US; 78 patients, families and caregivers were supported in the first halfyear of operation





# **Treat** *more* patients

Overall, we introduced two new medicines and increased our disease portfolio to include treatment for two new critical illnesses in 2023, further enhancing our support for patients in low and middle-income countries.

We know from our experience that lack of diagnostics and monitoring often stand in the way of higher patient survival rates and quality of life. Last year, we supported these critical components of patient care with nearly 7,300 diagnostic tests delivered to our partner institutions across 40 countries. In collaboration with the American Society for Clinical Pathology, we facilitated training and capacity building for diagnosis for advanced breast cancer in Mozambique.

#### Progress on our priorities

In 2023, our access and support programs reached nearly 37,000 patients and their families across Africa, the Middle East, Eastern Europe, Central Asia, Latin America, and Southeast Asia. We welcomed over 3,500 new patients who received treatment at no cost. Additionally, some of these patients benefited from transportation support, disease education, and schooling support services, which have proven to eliminate significant health barriers in the global communities we serve.

In the US, we launched Max GPS, a health navigation program targeting underserved communities, including those from refugee and migrant populations. Max GPS, launched initially in Washington State, is now well positioned to expand nationally. Together with the opening of our program in Central African Republic, we are now operating in 83 countries, collaborating with 300-plus institutions and 500-plus healthcare professionals to help patients in need.

In a groundbreaking milestone, we launched access to treatment and support for advanced breast cancer, with women in Mozambique and Nepal being the first patients to receive these treatments. In collaboration with ABC Global Alliance, we facilitated breast cancer clinical training sessions for 23 healthcare professionals from 10 countries. We initiated efforts to deliver two newly developed treatments for leukemia – a new medication developed for chronic lymphocytic leukemia, which will be the first treatment we make available for this disease starting in Armenia and Nepal, and the newest treatment developed for chronic myeloid leukemia starting with Cambodia, Nepal, Ghana, Honduras, Jamaica, Fiji, and Burkina Faso.

Now 34 and happily married with a 5-year-old, he says, "having benefited from The Max Foundation, my goal in life is to help and serve the poor in any way possible and lighten their burden."

# Amplify our voice



#### **Progress on our priorities**

For patients with critical illnesses, having a voice gives them agency and the ability to express their unique challenges. The patients and families we serve don't have that ability, living as they do in poorly resourced countries. We take this responsibility of amplifying their voices with utmost seriousness.

To that end, in 2023, we built a multi-faceted communications team with strong capabilities in storytelling, social media, and branding, and expanded our efforts in educating audiences on the need for universal access to innovative medicines. We expanded our partnerships, increased our speaking engagements at international conferences, authored articles in relevant publications, and strengthened our network with other patient organizations and leading experts. Articles co-authored by Pat Garcia-Gonzalez, together with industry leaders in Pharmaphorum, STAT, and other publications, highlighted the pressing need to step up global efforts to accelerate health equity.

Our CEO continued in her role as Chairperson of the Access to Oncology Medicines Coalition (ATOM) Council and was recognized by Fierce Healthcare/Fierce Lifesciences and the government of Kenya, among others, for The Max Foundation's continued drive to accelerate healthcare equity.

# Sustain our work

#### **Progress on our priorities**

Pat Garcia-Gonzalez has said, "Global markets require global strategies that address the unique challenges of access in lowto middle-income countries. No one entity has all the answers, but, together, we each hold valuable pieces of the puzzle and can create sustainable access models for patients."

In collaboration with our partners at the Humanitarian Partnership for Access to Critical Treatments (Humanitarian PACT), we delivered treatment access for breast cancer to hospitals in Mozambique and Nepal last year, with more countries to follow. We expanded our collaborations with the addition of new partnerships with BeiGene, Eli Lilly, and the International Workshop on Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (iwCLL) to provide treatment access and enhance the care for adult patients with chronic lymphocytic leukemia and advanced breast cancer. We expanded our network of implementing partners by welcoming 30 physicians, four new hospitals and six non-government organizations. This expansion in partners positions us well for further growth in the coming years.



### **Physician Perspective**

Access to adequate diagnosis and treatment is paramount to change the survival and the quality of life of patients with advanced breast cancer. The ABC Global Alliance is happy and proud to partner with The Max Foundation and our colleagues in Mozambique in this important program and to see the first patients being able to access important therapies. Together, we can make a bigger difference than isolated in improving the lives of patients and their families.

\*The Organization recognizes in-kind contributions consisting of pharmaceuticals, medical devices, and related products. These goods are recorded as inventory and revenue at fair value at the time received and as a reduction to inventory and program expense when the goods are distributed. Pharmaceutical inventory is released using a specific identification method based on expiration date and is reviewed at least annually for impairment. Pharmaceutical inventory is disposed and written off as obsolete when it is determined the pharmaceutical cannot be imported into a specific country of destination with shelf-life sufficient to comply with local importation regulations and the Organization's own guidelines.

Zimbabwe Parirenyatwa Hospital About 80% of breast cancer patients in some low- and middle-income countries are diagnosed at the metastatic stage. At Patan Hospital in Nepal, where Dr. Arun Shahi is a Senior Consultant of Medical Oncology, four to five patients are diagnosed daily with breast cancer. He remarks that cultural reasons and stigma prevent women in South Asian societies from getting periodic checks, and as a result they often receive a late diagnosis.
